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
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About Mansfield

We are recognised across the University of Oxford, the university sector and nationally as an outstanding leader in widening participation in world-class education,

by identifying and nurturing talent from the widest range of socio-economic backgrounds.

Mansfield became a full college of the University of Oxford in 1995; five years later, we launched a major initiative to welcome state school applicants, and by 2020 our offers to state school students had risen from 65% to over 90%.


Background to the Estate Transformation Project

In February 2025, we shared an overview of the holistic approach we are taking to address the challenges facing our physical estate.

This included outlining our plans to focus new development on the southern area of our estate, while improvements to the North Range will ensure our heritage buildings are fit for the future and their beauty shared and celebrated by all.

We explained how we have worked with technical experts to carefully assess the South Range buildings, considering options including retention, refurbishment, adaptation and extension, as well as evaluating the carbon footprint associated with retaining or replacing the buildings.

The review showed that replacement – done once and done well – will best support the College in the long term by delivering buildings that perform significantly better environmentally, functionally and in terms of accessibility.



We are now pleased to share more detailed plans that illustrate how we will:



Provide more on-site student accommodation.



Offer new, inclusive and accessible community and academic spaces for our students and staff.



Enhance our historic surroundings.



Achieve our goal of being net zero carbon by 2050.



Secure the financial future of Mansfield College.



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


The South Range – completing the quad

Our evidence-based decision to replace the South Range buildings has created a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity not only to meet the College’s operational and financial needs but also to complete the Main Quad.

The plan below outlines the proposed new footprint of the South Range, replacing a series of low-performing buildings with a single, unified building that respects and enhances the historic College setting by completing the Main Quad and forming new South and West Quads.

Internally, the South Range will feature new en-suite student bedrooms, academic and non-academic offices, a new point of arrival, a more accessible Porters’ Lodge, shared student kitchens and new Junior and Middle Common Rooms (the JCR and MCR).

South Range - Indicative ground floor arrangement



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


The South Range – learning from Champneys

The following five steps demonstrate how the architect Basil Champneys' design of the North Range has guided our approach to the new South Range.

1. A new tower

The South Range's quad facing gable ends are shaped to become part of the recognisable family of features associated with Mansfield College.

2. Anchored corners and framed entrance


The north-east corner steps inwards, aligning with the Chapel to create a welcoming entrance court. This design creates a strong sense of unity between the new and historic buildings, using both to frame the outdoor space. Additionally, views of the Chapel gable and North Range are carefully preserved.

3. Distinctive functions


The tower acts as a bookend to both the East Wing and Spine, negotiating the point at which they meet and marking the point of entry to the College with measured confidence.

4. Hard-working wings and spine


The South Range is designed around a central 'spine' with branching 'wings' that allow for flexible use and easy adaptation. Its efficient structural grid supports student bedrooms in a home-like layout but can also be opened up to create larger spaces for academic use if needed in the future. This flexible design approach underlies the ambition for the South Range to serve the College effectively for over 100 years.





5. Passages and connectivity

Permeability is a key focus, connecting the northern and southern sides of the estate. This approach integrates new and existing spaces, enhances circulation, improves visibility between areas, and continues Oxford's tradition of intriguing doorways and passageways. Additionally, passageways and colonnades offer sheltered outdoor spaces.

The South Range – prospective views

The plan and prospective views shown here are the result of extensive design development and consultation with Oxford City Council, the Oxford Design Review Panel, Historic England, local residents and members of the College community.

This collaborative process has helped shape a proposal that is sensitive to its historic context, responsive to feedback and aligned with the College’s long-term needs.

An open and accessible landscape

Equally important are the College grounds, which, along with our buildings, reflect Mansfield’s commitment to being an open and welcoming College.


We are proud of our Main Quad, a key part of the college’s identity. By contrast the Legacy Garden, though more intimate, currently suffers from limited light, poor accessibility due to level changes and disruption from Staircase E and bike parking.

As the plan below shows, our evidence-based decision to replace the South Range enables us to introduce a new South and West Quad, that along with a holistic landscape plan for the whole estate, will provide welcoming and inclusive spaces for staff, students, neighbours and wildlife – with a goal to boost on-site biodiversity by at least 10%.

Back in February, we introduced our plan to create a new pocket park at our entrance on Mansfield Road.


As shown in the before and after views below, the proposed design moves the secure line to the far corner of the Chapel to create a welcoming, publicly accessible landscaped area, with the new Porters' Lodge clearly visible on the left.



View of the proposed College entrance from Mansfield Road



A further new entrance is proposed at the south-east corner of the College, adjacent to the Civil War Ramparts. The design opens up generous views into the new South Quad and along the Ramparts, improving sightlines and enhancing views along the College's southern edge.

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
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Northern area improvements


Back in February, we shared our vision to ensure our heritage buildings are fit for the future – supporting our operational needs while allowing their beauty to be shared and celebrated by all.

We introduced our proposal to make better use of the space behind the North Range. As shown in the plan below, this includes a new two-storey Mews Building designed to significantly enhance the estate’s functionality, accessibility and sustainability.

- **Mews Building:** A new detached Mews Building along the northern boundary will house catering ancillary facilities and the necessary plant to help decarbonise our heritage buildings.
- **Northwest addition:** A passenger lift extension will further our ambition to provide step-free access to all feasible floors of the Champneys buildings. This includes our beautiful Main Library.
- **Bike storage:** Around 150 mainly double-stacked bike stands will provide secure, convenient cycling facilities for students and staff.

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
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


Creating a sustainable place


We are deeply committed to improving environmental sustainability in all our activities. With a primary focus on enhancing the energy efficiency of our estate, we believe that every step we take can create a lasting positive impact on our community and the environment.

As shown in the first diagram below, our holistic estate approach is guided by targets that will drive the project team toward achieving Net Zero Operational Carbon for new buildings, and a Net Zero Carbon in Operation estate by 2050.

Back in February, we also discussed how achieving a sustainable financial model will enable us to reinvest in improving the sustainability of our heritage assets. The second plan highlights one element of the proposed works for the North Range as part of this commitment.






The College experience

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
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Ensuring Mansfield thrives for generations to come

Provide welcoming and inclusive landscape spaces for staff, students, neighbours and wildlife — with a goal to boost on-site biodiversity by at least 10%.



Create more space for commercial bookings and academic events — supporting a steady income that can be reinvested, while welcoming a wider and more diverse audience to enjoy our facilities.



Reduce costly external accommodation rentals and operating expenses.



Free up housing in the city and reduce pressure on Oxford's housing market.



Enhance the environmental performance of our buildings, reducing energy consumption and lowering our operational costs.


